

Categories of prepositions

What are prepositions?

Prepositions link nouns, pronouns and phrases to other words in a sentence. The word or phrase that the preposition introduces is called the 'object' of the preposition. Here are some commonly used prepositions:

Prepositions can be categorised into the following:

- Prepositions of place (See table 2)
- More prepositions (See table 3)



Table 1: Prepositions of time (adapted from Lingo4you 2010)				
Preposition	Usage	Example		
on	 days of the week 	The lecture is on Friday .		
in	 months/seasons time of day year after a certain period of time 	The exams are in July .		
		I have a study group meeting <i>in the afternoon</i> .		
		I graduated from this university <i>in 2011</i> .		
		I have to meet my lecturer in two hours .		
- for	- for night	l usually do my revision at night .		
	 for weekend a certain period of time 	We got together to work on our project <i>at/on the weekend</i> .		
		I submitted my assignment at 2.00pm today.		
since	 from a certain period of time (past till now) 	I have been working on this report <i>since 8.00am</i> .		
for	 over a certain period of time 	I will be studying in the library <i>for four hours</i> .		
ago	- a certain time in the past	I completed my Arts degree <i>two years ago</i> .		
before	 earlier than a certain point of time 	I usually work at the cafe <i>before lectures</i> .		
to	- telling the time	What time is it? It is <i>quarter to five</i> .		
past	- telling the time	Why don't you take a break from your studies? It is half past one and you have not eaten anything since breakfast.		
to/till/until	 marking the beginning and the end of the period of time 	I will be in the Language Laboratory from 8.00am to/till/until 1.00pm.		
till/until	 in the sense of how long something is going to last 	I will be available for student consultation <i>till/until</i> 4.00pm today.		
by	 in the sense of 'at the least' up to a certain time 	I need to complete this essay by 5 o'clock . By 8.00pm , I had revised three topics for the exam.

in	- room, building, street, town,	We met <i>in the seminar</i> room.		
	country	Can you refer to the quotation <i>in the</i>		
	- book, paper, etc.	book?

		Wherever you go <i>in the world</i> , you will not find a better teacher.		
at	- meaning next to, by an object	I will meet you at the station beside the university.		
	- for table			
	- for events	Many serious issues were discussed at the		
	- place where you do something	table.		
	typical (study, work, etc.)	We met at the workshop .		
		I will try to revise the report at uni .		
on	- attached	That is my painting you see on the wall .		
	- for a place with a river

below	- lower than something else but	You need to go below the surface to find		
	above ground	the true meaning of that sentence.

Preposition	Usage	Example		
across	- getting to the other side (also over)	I <i>walked across the lawn</i> to get to the other side of the campus. I <i>walked across the bridge</i> and saw some beautiful flowers growing on the bank.		
through	 something with limits on top, bottom and sides 	We had to <i>drive through the tunnel</i> to get to the university.		
to	 movement to person or building movement to a place or country for bed 	I went to the tutor for help. When I graduate, I want to go to Europe . Why don't you go to bed now? You have an early lecture tomorrow.		
into	- enter a room or building	The instructor told us to go into the seminar room.		
towards	 movement in the direction of something (but not directly to it) 	Go towards the cafe and you will see the library.		
onto	- movement to the top of something	I was so tired yesterday that I <i>fell onto the</i> <i>bed</i> as soon as I got home.		
from	- in the sense of where from	I downloaded an e-book on academic writing <i>from the library</i> .
