



Self-awareness and developing your professional identity

Being aware of your skills, abilities and strengths helps develop the 'the ability to collect, interpret and analyse information and reflect on one's own beliefs in order to form judgements' or for 'self-authorship' (Magolda.1998).

This ability to construct your own vision, create meaning to experiences, make informed decisions, act appropriately and to take responsibility for actions is defined as developing self-authorship

Self-awareness and developing your professional identity

University studies helps to develop knowledge and skills to translate into employment after graduation. Your placement experience or industry experience (IE) imparts another level of learning about the

Australian workplace and the role of the professional. You are developing not only new knowledge and skills but are also developing your professional identity, as you observe the nature of the workplace and how people operate within it.

Your observations and reflections will help you analyse your experiences and provide insights about yourself. You will find you respond to work situations not as a student but as a professional.

Becoming aware of this phase is coming into your pre-professional identity (PPI) state.



Self-awareness and developing your professional identity

To summarise, during your university years you begin to develop a tertiary student identity with which you identify yourself as a student in your degree program, possibly related in the pursuit of a high GPA. Your placement experience represents a cross-road as a precursor to the emergence of a new pre-professional identity (PPI) as you navigate new professional environments and observe the role of professionals and others in it.


'PPI encompasses 'feelings of personal adequacy and satisfaction in performing the expected role' (Paterson et al. 2002, 7) and occurs when a member of a profession develops the 'attitudes, beliefs and standards which support the practitioner role and the development of an identity as a member of the profession with a clear understanding of the responsibilities of being a ... professional'
