- Select satisfactory or unsatisfactory for the sections of **safe practice and duty of care** as well as **professional and ethical conduct**, making comments where appropriate.
- 2 Select the most appropriate category that describes the student's work and comment as appropriate.
- 3 Include your name, and date along with any additional comments in the section provided.
- 4 Discuss the contents of this report with the student.
