

# **Teaching Pathway Requirements**

There are two options for entering Secondary Visual Arts teaching offered by UniSA via the Bachelor of Contemporary Art. On successful completion of either option, you will meet the criteria\* to apply for registration as a teacher in South Australia and interstate. \*other criteria may apply

#### Option 1:

Study the following packaged pathway combination (entrance would have been through the SATAC code: 424811):

• Bachelor of Contemporary Art and Master of Teaching (Secondary).

With the guaranteed entry pathway, once you successfully complete your undergraduate degree, you will automatically gain entry into the Master of Teaching (Secondary)\*.

\*subject to meeting GPA requirements and subject selection (see below for specific courses required)

#### Option 2:

Study the relevant 3 year undergraduate degree:

• Bachelor of Contemporary Art

On successful completion of your undergraduate degree, you will need to apply via SATAC and enrol in the following postgraduate program in teaching with UniSA:

Master of Teaching (Secondary) \*
 \*subject to meeting entry requirements (see below for specific courses required)

#### Specific courses required

To meet the entry requirements of the Master of Teaching (Secondary), you must also study courses in a second learning area (beyond the Arts) during your Bachelor of Contemporary Art. The second learning area must align with the Australian Curriculum.

To complete your second learning area, you will need a minor (4 courses) in one of the following areas:

- Humanities and Social Sciences
- Media Art / Digital Media
- Drama and Creative Arts: Performing Arts (Drama)
- Mathematics
- English
- Languages (French, Japanese or Italian)
- Science (Physics, Biology or Chemistry)

### Students should also consider the following:

- To maximise your opportunities for placement as an art teacher upon completion of the Master of Teaching degree, including courses in the following areas would be recommended:
  - Painting
  - Drawing
  - Sculpture
  - Photography
  - Printmaking
- It is recommended that at least one course in either **painting** or **drawing** is undertaken

# Science (Physics, Chemistry or Biology)

PLEASE NOTE the following: SACE Stage 2 Physics is Assumed Knowledge for the Major in Physics; SACE Stage 2 Chemistry is Assumed Knowledge for the Major in Chemistry; SACE Stage 2 Mathematical Methods is Assumed Knowledge for the Major in Mathematics; SACE Stage 2 Language is Assumed Knowledge for the Major in Languages; and SACE Stage 2 English or SACE Stage 2 English Literary Studies is Assumed Knowledge for the Major in English. Students are assumed to have studied the above prior to enrolling into the program and selecting one or more of the relevant Learning Areas. Assumed Knowledge is an advantage but not essential for entry into a program.
